- c. To be really sick.

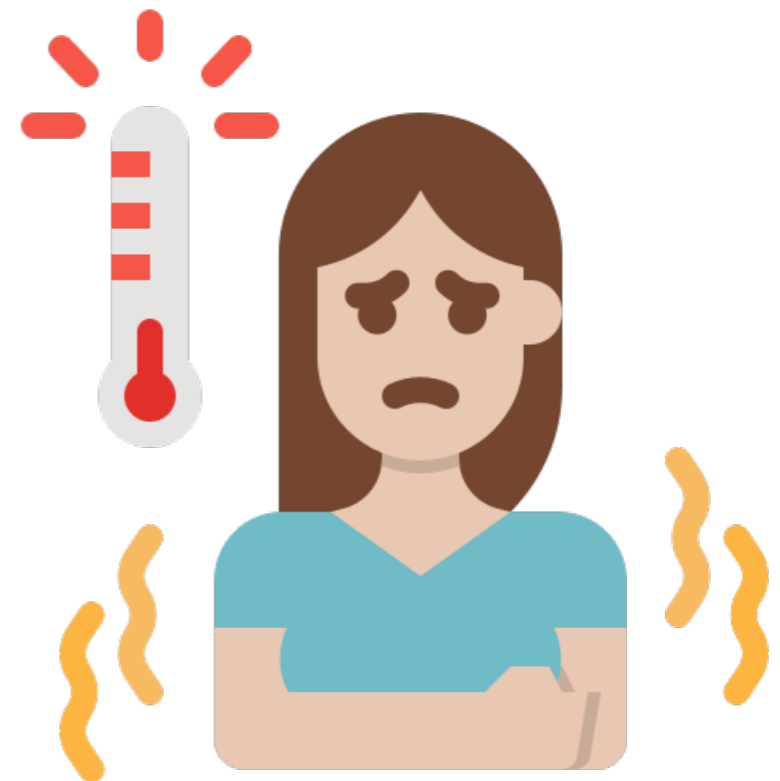


A fiddle - A violin
